
I'm flattered to have been asked to participate in the DirectGrace Project. As a musician, and as a human being, it brings me great satisfaction to know that these songs are being used to help. Today millions of children - the most vulnerable members of our human family - have been sorely neglected in the wake of rapid globalization. I have seen the effect of crushing poverty on the lives of kids firsthand. My parents, Len and Georgia Morris, are documentary film makers, and in the summer of 2002 I had the good fortune to accompany my father and a cameraman, Robin Romano, to Kenya, to document the plight of child laborers and their families working for pennies in the coffee industry.

What I witnessed in those three and a half weeks shook me to the fiber of my being. Girls as young as five, their infant siblings strapped across their backs, picking red coffee beans in the sweltering heat alongside their mother, father, aunts, uncles, brothers and sisters. Blackened sores, once little more than mosquito bites, covered their limbs; the pesticide applied to the plants had weakened their immune systems, making them especially vulnerable to infection. We split our time in the coffee fields between first aid and filming. It was jarring, tragic, and all too real.

For the sake of every child who suffers in poverty, I wish Peter Lederman and the DirectGrace team continued and enduring success.
